New members to be sworn in

The winners of November's municipal elections will take office in December. Some local towns had more notable elections than others, but all experienced some changes.

Every local town has at least one new face on its governing board.

Here's a look at when the new boards will be sworn in.

CARY

When: Tuesday, Dec. 8, 6:30 p.m.
Where: Town Hall council chambers, 316 N. Academy St., Cary
Who: Cary Mayor Harold Weinbrecht and three council members will be sworn in. Weinbrecht is entering his third term.

Incumbents Don Frantz, who won his District B seat, and Lori Bush, an at-large member, rejoin the board. Frantz is entering his third term while Bush will start a second term.


The one new member will be Ken George, founder and president of Net-Smart Inc., who will fill the District D seat that has been vacant for nearly a year. He defeated three other candidates and encountered a runoff. On Oct. 6, George faced Cary residents Maria Cervania, Nancy Caggia and Gray Rinehart. George was the top vote-getter, but didn't have a majority of the vote, which allowed Cervania, the second votegetter, to call for a runoff.

During a November runoff, George defeated Cervania, a former project manager with the Texas Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services. He'll now occupy the seat that has been unoccupied since former Councilwoman Gale Adcock was elected to the state House last November. The seat covers parts of central and west Cary.

When: Tuesday, Dec. 8, 6:30 p.m. Where: Town Hall, 100

Town Hall Drive, Morrisville Who: Incumbents Liz Johnson and Michael Schlink won re-election. Satish Garimella, a political newcomer, beat former board member Pete Martin for an open seat on the council. Garimella was born in India and now works as a telecommunications specialist for AT&T. He's president of the Breckenridge homeowners association.
